Richard F. Milner, of Medford, passed away on Saturday, February 22, 2020. He was 89. Born in Chicago, IL; the son of the late Charles and Florence Milner and husband of the late Ardith L. Milner.

Richard grew up in Camden, NJ and graduated with a B.S. from the University of Pennsylvania, Wharton School of Business in 1953. He served in the U.S. Air Force on active duty during the Korean War and retired as a Lt. Colonel after over 20 years as a reservist. He was CEO of Flouro-Plastics, Inc., in Philadelphia, a family-founded business, until he retired in 1989. Richard raised his family in Cinnaminson and Lumberton. He loved the outdoors, and spending time with his family and his friends.

He is survived by his children, Richard (Terri), Jon (Tricia), and Tori; grandchildren, Geoffrey, Kimberly, Jon, Samantha, Brooke, Meghan, Jack, and Madelyn; brother, C. George II (Marlene); step-sons, Brian Lane and his daughter, Colleen, and Blair Lane and his children, Christian, Spencer, and Olivia. He is predeceased by his former wife, Marilyn and his son, Geoffrey Larkin Milner.
