“ I first met Mario in late 1976. His son Matt and I went to college together and eventually became pledge brothers in the same fraternity. During summer breaks, Matt & I would work for the construction crew Mario oversaw. I learned a lot from him; when I first started with them I didn't even know how to hold a hammer. He taught me how to hang sheetrock and tape the corners and joints, how to mix cement, properly stain wood trim, etc. Of course, as a "gofer" I was low man on the crew totem pole so I got the fun jobs like carrying bundles of shingles up ladders to multi-story rooftops and removing old fiberglass insulation. Always kind and looking out for me, he'd quietly let me know after my first insulation removal to take a cold shower when I got home so I wouldn't itch for the next two weeks. I'll definitely miss hearing him ask me to get him something out of his reach, saying "Art, gimme dis-a-one." And when I typically picked up the wrong item, he would always say "Dummy guy! Not demma one, dissa one!" He was one of a kind and will be missed by everyone that met him.
