Raymond Anton Haas, loving husband of the late Lillian Theresa nee Mercier for 67 years, passed away Sunday, January 10, 2016 at home surrounded by his family, at the age of 92 years. Raymond was born in Tomah, Wisconsin to Anton & Erma (nee Lange) Haas and was a longtime resident of Mount Holly. He was a WWII Naval veteran, having served in the Pacific aboard the destroyer escort USS Dionne as an electrician. His career, subsequently, was as an electrician, working for Wisconsin Power & Light, Danskammer, Convair and General Dynamics before settling in Mt. Holly, where he worked at Roebing Steel, Hill Refrigeration and finally Homosote in Trenton from where he retired after many years of service. He loved sports, especially baseball, having tried out for the Boston Red Socks and playing on local teams in his younger years. He was a member of Sacred Heart Parish, the Knights of Columbus and in his earlier years an adult leader and Scout Master for the Boy Scouts, C.Y.O. baseball coach and member of The Holy Name Society. He is predeceased by his sisters, Alice Schaller & Gladys Sadoski. He is survived by his children Nancy Haas, Steven Haas (Susan), Pamela Nolasco (Thomas), Susan Mahon (Michael), Donna Morgan (David) and Mark Haas (Kara), 17 grandchildren, 16 great-grandchildren and his brother Donald. Mass of Christian Burial will be celebrated on Friday at 11:00 at the Sacred Heart Church, 260 High St., Mount Holly preceded by a viewing from 10-11 AM at the Church.
