Thomas R. Haines, also known as Gus, of New Lisbon, Pemberton Township, passed away on Sunday, October 6, 2019 at his home. He was 74.

Born in Mount Holly, Gus was a lifelong Pemberton resident. He was a graduate of Pemberton High School Class of 1962. He was graduated from Rutgers University in 1966 and was a member of the Beta Theta Pi fraternity. He received a Master's Degree in Environmental Education from Glassboro State College. Gus taught 7th and 8th grade Science, coached basketball and football, and was a Curriculum Supervisor at Pemberton Township Schools from 1966 to 2000. He was a Blueberry Grower on the family blueberry farm from 1969-present. He enjoyed to travel, especially with Joe Laufer's group.

He was a member of the Burlington County Board of Agriculture, the New Jersey Farm Bureau, and the Garden State Gun Club.

He is survived by a son and daughter-in-law Tim & Traci Haines of Pemberton Township; 3 grandsons: Thomas, Steven, and Jonathan Haines; 2 sisters: Connie Emmons & Ruth Ann Brower; his caregiver and friend Cobby as well as many friends.

A Memorial Service will be held on Friday at 11:00am at the Pemberton United Methodist Church, Hanover St., Pemberton. Burial will follow in the Odd

Fellows Cemetery in Pemberton Boro. Friends may visit with the family on Thursday evening from 6-8 pm at the Perinchief Chapels, 438 High St., Mount Holly. “ When Tom was about 23 he hired the local New Lisbon kids to work on his Blueberry Farm. There was year around work for us whenever we wanted it. Some people called him Gus but to the Goodman, Raups, Dicus, and Doyle families, he was mostly "The Bear". He was ten years older than most of us but he related to us very well. He set the example and we followed. He had a rye sense of humor and willing to do things that even as teens we thought a bit extreme. I met him as the farmer on the next farm over that would periodically "raid our farm." Basically that consisted of a bunch of teen boys getting in the back of at pickup jumping out at the rotten/green berry pile and making a big mess, throwing berries on the opposing farmer's crew, who would return the favor. Raids were typically done at noon so that all forces would be available. It was a great worker retention program. Even at 15, I could not believe this guy! He knew how to live.

I began pruning for him, usually with a gang of friends. I was hesitant because he was known to expect a lot from his workers. We called him The Bear. He always worked with us, no exceptions. Pruning is hard work. We worked full days with only lunch breaks. We talked all day, sharing everything. Tom knew more of life that we did so we always asked for advise. We all became life long friends. We were always respected and always welcome. In many ways he modeled us, made us better.

One day we were pruning near the road and a friend our age Robin Haines stopped. He watched us work then told us we were not pruning correctly. The Bear gave him shears and gloves and asked him to show us how to do it. Robin worked long and hard instructing us, The Bear would ask him a point or two to keep him working. When we got to the thorn patches that we all hated, he asked Robin to show us how to deal with them and Robin did one patch after the next. At this point everyone but Robin saw that "The Bear was teaching Robin. He asked Robin to show us how to pull sapling which had to be removed roots and all. Robin vigorously attacked each one but had to skip many as he could not pop them out. I

never saw The Bear fail to pop a sapling out although when the ground was hard frozen they could resist him for a short time. That day The bear popped all the saplings out that Robin could not pull and thanked him for the lesson. We were much amused at how The Bear handled the situation and how much work Robin did. It was easy to work hard for Tom. He made it fun and loved us all.

The Bear loved Basket Ball and so did we. We played hundred of nights. The bear was an exceptional rebounder, not tall but if he got a hand on a ball it was his. Before we could drive he would take us bowling, out for pizza or fried chicken, all the things teen boys want to do. We were very blessed to know this man. He was our friend and second father.

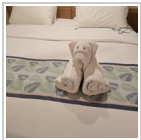

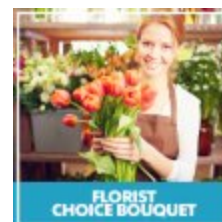
