He described himself as quirky which is true in a sense but not a descriptor I would use. Warren was uniquely pure of heart. A generous, kind, patient, fun, and of course witty person. A bit counter culture but not purposely. He was the perfect blend of logical and open minded. I couldn't go to him to validate my feelings on everything but what I would get is the truth. He had a perspective that was wise and beyond his years. We had some very good, very humorous experiences. Making him laugh was one of the greatest joys in my life and if I kept pressing him, would evolve into this uncontrolled cackle that was uniquely his. I stayed local but despite this still got to see him in person a few times a year. 2018 was particularly good for us. We finished castle crashers and overcooked to 100% completion somewhere between November and December. The very last game, and I still have the save file, was playing Metroid on the super nintendo. We intended to finish it on his next visit. February 2019 he was still alive to see pictures of my first born but unfortunately my son would never meet his uncle. I had wanted them to spend time together and I had foreseen a future in which Warren would teach him programming. I still think of him every day and of this void that can never be filled. I hope anyone who reads this thinks about the impact they have on others and they on them - and that every decision is made with this in mind
